General income for March was \$3638.67. This income is from collection at church, building use, and interest income.

We paid for the repairs to the furnace from the failure we had around Thanksgiving. The amount was \$2304.00. The second quarter general liability insurance was due before April 1 in the amount of \$2730.25. Having two large bills due in the same month puts a strain on the budget. \$5000.00 from the LICE unds investment account to cover these expenditures.

The Lasagna Dinner generated \$1148.00 for the Vacation Bible School program and Sunday School expenses during the year.

March Noisy Offering for Rienks Family produced a very generous \$625.00.

Resurrection Cookies

On the night before Easter, prepare this recipe with your children or grandchildren as a hands-on way to teach the Easter story.



INGREDIENTS

1 cup pecans 1 teaspoon vinegar

3 egg whites

Pinch of salt

1 cup sugar

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Preheat oven to 300°F.
- 2. Place pecans in a zip-top plastic bag and let the children beat them with a wooden spoon or rolling pin to break into small pieces. Explain that after Jesus was arrested, He was beaten by the Roman soldiers. Read John 19:1-3.
- 3. Let each child smell the vinegar. Put 1 teaspoon vinegar into a mixing bowl. Explain that when Jesus was thirsty on the cross, He was given vinegar to drink. Read John 19:28-30.
- 4. Add egg whites to the vinegar. Explain that eggs represent life and Jesus gave His life to give us life. Read John 10:10-11.
- 5. Sprinkle a pinch of salt into each child's hand. Let them taste it and brush the rest into the bowl. Explain that this represents the salty tears shed by Jesus' followers and the bitterness of our own sin. Read Luke 23:27.
- 6. Add 1 cup sugar to the bowl. Explain that the sweetest part of the story is that Jesus died because He loves us. He wants us to know and belong to Him. Read Psalms 34:8 and John 3:16.
- 7. Beat with a mixer on high speed for 12 to 15 minutes until the mixture forms stiff peaks. Explain that the color white represents the purity in God's eyes for those whose sins have been cleansed by Jesus. Read Isaiah 1:18 and John 3:1-3.
- 8. Fold in broken nuts. Drop by teaspoons onto two parchment-lined cookie sheets. Explain that each mound represents the rocky tomb where Jesus' body was laid. Read Matthew 27:57-60.
- 9. Put the cookies in the oven, close the door, and turn off the oven. Give each chile a piece of tape and seal the oven door closed. Explain that Jesus' tomb was sealed. Read Matthew 27:65-66.
- 10.Go to bed! Explain that they may feel sad to leave the cookies in the oven overnight. However, Jesus' followers were also in despair when the tomb was sealed. Read John 16:20 and 22.
- 11.On Easter morning, open the oven and give everyone a cookie. Notice the cracked surface and take a bite. The cookies are hollow! Explain that on the first Easter, Jesus' followers were stunned to find the tomb open and empty. Read Matthew 28:1-9.
