# Pastor Anne's Message, January 2021

Grace to you in peace from God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit! Welcome the New Year 2021! As we greet the new year with all its hope and promise, let us look back together at some of the special highlights of the "Year 2020." Sunday, December 27th, my message to the congregation was about "Recognizing the Silver Lining." Read on for the "silver linings" of our year, 2020, together.

Five members of our congregation were baptized in February, July, August, and September. The August baptisms were in the Colorado River at Palisade's Riverbend Park. We are so pleased and proud of Rachael Jennings who is the artistic director and instructor for her "PV Tumblers Dance Studio." Children and adults alike look forward to the time she may reopen her studio in the church's gym and resume teaching.



Our Sunday morning worship attendance is strong and steady. Before the pandemic, we had as many as 48 people in worship (February 9th); and on February 23rd, for our regular and Ash Wednesday Services, 40 people worshipped and received ashes. The trend continues with numbers increasing week by week as most of our families have been able to return.

We remember with great joy the Reception of New members on March 8th and March 15th. We welcomed thirteen new members! We gathered for worship for eleven Sundays, January 5th through March 15th, 2020. Then, due to the coronavirus, we immediately and temporarily stopped in-person worship and changed to worship services mailed out in print and on email to 58 households. This number grew to 75 households by spring.

Sveto continued the Daily Sentinel newspaper delivery to Collbran on Mondays, throughout our building closure. Remember that "the church remained open and active, only the building was closed." 😊 E-mail communication increased throughout the months within

our many households and in several states.

On Sunday, June 7<sup>th</sup>, we returned to in-person worship, following the guidelines of the Rocky Mountain Conference, the state, and Mesa County. Communion has been responsibly and safely given. On June 21<sup>st</sup>, we celebrated Father's Day with eleven dads receiving Enstrom candy bars.

I participated in making the Rocky Mountain Conference Puppet Show through ZOOM calls and virtual filming. My puppet was "Edith", and the purpose of the puppet show was to invite all Rocky Mountain conference churches to the Annual Celebration/Conference Meeting in July, also held via ZOOM call. I attended throughout the week of July 20 – 24.

Saturday, August 8, I officiated for the Memorial Graveside Service for Rose May Branson at Cedar Crest Cemetery.

Sunday, September 13, red roses were given to all grandparents in observance of Grandparent's Day.

Pastor Anne attended the two-day class (Via ZOOM) required by the conference: "A Position of Trust: Committing to Healthy Ministry." In the past it was called "Boundary Training." Pastors are to renew this training every 5 years. This was Pastor Anne's second-class completion.

Monday, November 30, I officiated for the Memorial Graveside Service for Dorothy Hawkins at Cedar Crest Cemetery.

Our Advent Candle lightings were on November 29th ~ HOPE; December 6th ~ LOVE; December 13th ~ JOY; December 20th ~ PEACE and the CHRIST candle; and December 27th ~ ALL CANDLES were relit. Lew and Tilda Evans, the Yanez Family, Jerry and Charli Gaddy, the Murphy/Cox Families, Sylvia Spangler, and Beverly Loftus were our candle lighters this Advent Season.

On Sunday, December 27th, we celebrated Advent IV and our Christmas Eve Candlelight Service combined, at 11:00AM. We look forward to the hope and great expectation of holding the candlelight service next Christmas Eve, December 24, 2021 open to the community once again!

Love and gratitude to every one of you for your love, support, flexibility, diligence, patience, prayers, and encouragement throughout this unprecedented year of challenge and growth.


## Trustees' Report January 2021


# Stained Glass Windows Update



In the fall of 2019, the Trustees contacted Willet-Hauser Architectural Glass Restoration for an evaluation of the stained glass windows. After an on-site visit and evaluation, Willet-Hauser determined that we needed to clean and reseal the exterior of the glass, stabilize and replace the protective covering, and repair and repaint the exterior frames.

The crew arrived after our first December snowstorm. I am sure many of you saw the canvas wrapped scaffolding over the windows as they worked. The foggy plexiglass was replaced with a transparent acrylic that should

remain clearer. It has been over 25 years since the windows were refurbished. It is so important to maintain the integrity of the glass and frames. These repairs should protect the windows for another 25 years.
