Scammers Beware!

There seem to be more scams coming our way over the holidays and into the New Year. I would like to take a minute to try to give some guidance to avoid being caught in these sneaky webs.

Beware of anyone calling on the phone telling you they have a package to deliver to you but there must be an error in the address. DO NOT GIVE THEM YOUR ADDRESS. Hang up the phone.

The following article was received from the Social Security Administration warning of current, active scams.

Many of us spend the holidays relaxing and sharing in goodwill with friends and family. But some bad actors use the holidays to take advantage of people's generous spirits. Scammers frequently target the older and other more vulnerable members of our communities. They pretend they are from Social Security or another government agency to steal your money or personal information.

Caller ID, texts, or documents sent by email may look official, but they are not. Fraudsters are calling to verify information about the 2023 cost-of-living adjustment for people who get benefits. Remember, this adjustment is automatic and a beneficiary does not need to verify anything. Social Security won't ask you to provide information or money to get your benefit increase. Know that how we do business with you doesn't change because it's the holidays. We may email or text you about programs and services, but we will never ask for personal information via email or text.



Recognizing the signs of a scam can help you avoid falling victim to one. These scams primarily use the telephone to contact you, but scammers may also use email, text messages, social media, or U.S. mail. Scammers **pretend** to be from an agency or organization you know to gain your trust. Scammers say there is a **problem with your Social Security number or account**. Scammers **pressure** you to act immediately. Scammers tell you to **pay** in a specific way.

Know what to look for and be alert. Scammers don't take days off and neither should you... when it comes to making sure you identify suspicious communications and report it. If you receive a questionable call, text, or email, hang up or don't respond and report it at <u>oig.ssa.gov/report</u>. Scammers frequently change their methods with new tactics and messages to trick people. We encourage you to stay up to date on the latest news and advisories by following SSA's Office of the Inspector General on LinkedIn, Twitter, and Facebook by subscribing to receive email alerts.

Those working on their computers are fair game to many scams. There are several indicators of illicit activity. If you did not request information from a company's website do not respond to their queries online. Emails are often fraudulent and if you respond to the email or call the phone number on the email you are caught in their web. HANG UP THE PHONE IF YOU EVER

HAVE ANY QUESTION. Do not give out bank account information, your name, date of birth, or social security number. As one friend discovered they requested she fill out a check and hold it up so they could take a picture of it.

If you have a question about your Social Security, Medicare, or Bank Accounts it is important you contact the office directly. The phone number will be on the letter you received in the mail with all of your correct information.

If you are contacting Social Security, Medicare, or your bank on your computer be sure you have a secure website. It is important that you read the address before you ever open the page. It is often the case a bogus company will supersede your query and direct you into their web page before you realize what has happened. Government services should not cost you anything. If your credit card is requested or an amount posted to provide the service it is important to close the page. Back out of the search engine you selected and start over being much more cautious.

People can call and tell you they are with any company and agency in the country but it is your responsibility to not fall into their traps. The FBI has no reason to call you. Believe me that is not how they would contact you if they wanted to talk to you.

The power company will not call up and ask for payment in gift cards from Walmart. HANG UP!

Donating to charities over the phone and online can also be fraud. Do not give out your credit card numbers or personal information. If you choose to donate to a charity select one you know well and trust. Donate locally or to a charity you are already connected with.

Like everyone says, "I don't want to scare you but..." Maybe I do want to scare you just a little.

Please be cautious, be suspicious, quick to stop the call or computer contact. Read your senior citizen magazines when they come in the mail. They often have articles on protecting yourself and your information. Be informed.
